BORDERS / BORDER-CROSSINGS

Professor Robert Schwartzwald, Université de Montréal and Professors Marta Dvorak & Catherine Lanone, Université de Paris 3 (Sorbonne Nouvelle)

Description:

In Paris (January 8-15, 2012) and in Montréal (June 9-17, 2012), students take seminars with professors from both universities. These seminars pursue the topic of borders and border-crossings from various critical angles and in various Englishlanguage texts. In addition to allowing students to further their understanding of the problematic and of the texts under study, the Paris Exchange Seminar affords alternative perspectives on what constitutes "English Studies" at French-language institutions in Europe and North America. This larger question of « l'anglais en contact », especially where English finds itself in a minority situation, is an important context for the exchange.

Requirements:

Participation in seminar discussion 20%

Long term paper (15-18 pages) 50%

(If you write your paper on a Paris section of the course, it must be submitted by February 29, 2012. If you write your paper on a Montreal section, it must be submitted by July 15, 2012.)

Short term paper (5-6 pages) 30%

(If written on a Paris section, the deadline is February 29, 2012. If written on a Montreal section, the deadline is July 15, 2012.)

At least one of the papers must be written on material presented by Professors Dvorak or Lanone, and the other paper on material presented by Professor Schwartzwald.

Professor Lanone's section will consider the impact of the Franklin expedition and the traumatic blurring of boundaries between the savage and the civilized (and between imperialism and disaster) which the lost expedition entailed. We will analyze twentieth-century and twenty-first century rewritings of the Franklin story, dwelling on the feminine and post-colonial implications of this archetypal story of failed conquest and desperate search for the Northwest Passage.
